Pahari painting (literally meaning a painting from the mountainous regions: pahar means a mountain in Hindi) is an umbrella term used for a form of Indian painting, done mostly in miniature forms, originating from Himalayan hill kingdoms of North India, during 17th-19th century, notably Basohli, Mankot, Nurpur, Chamba, Kangra, Guler, Mandi, and Garhwal.

This was the early phase and expressive faces with a receding hairline and big eyes that are shaped like lotus petals characterize it. These paintings use a lot of primary colors as symbols, i.e., red for love, yellow for love and green.

This painting testifies to another fundamental aspect of the Pahari technique. The artist perfected the image through a practice of erasure—first creating, then letting go.

Pahari miniatures, known for their soft touch, serenity, lyricism, spontaneity, inherent symbolism, superb sense of composition, minute details and a deep feeling for human emotions, denote the miniature paintings rendered around the lower Himalayan hills and the plains of Punjab from the early 17th to mid-19th century.
