Complex drugs and regimes can be difficult to manage and the heart failure MDT, especially the heart failure specialist nurse, can help. Place your patient on your heart failure register – OOF code HF 001 for holding a register, HF 002 for a confirmed diagnosis by specialist and echocardiography, HF 003 for prescribing of ACE inhibitor or ARB, HF 004 for additionally prescribed 6-blocker.

Congestive cardiac failure (CCF) is a complex syndrome that is usually caused by the inability of heart to pump sufficient blood to meet metabolic needs of body during exercise. It is more commonly known as heart failure³⁸ and it can affect either left or right ventricle or both³⁹.
