A clinically established psychogenic disorder is one that is inconsistent over time or is incongruent with the known pattern of an established movement disorder and is accompanied by obvious psychiatric disturbance, other psychosomatic disorders, and other neurologic signs that are definitely psychogenic.

What are the treatment approaches for psychogenic movement ...

Psychogenic movement disorders are common and disabling. They should be diagnosed where possible on the basis of positive aspects of the history and examination. A developing understanding of the pathophysiology of these disorders has moved away from pure psychological explanations in favor of broader biopsychosocial models.

Functional movement disorders represent a challenge for the clinical practitioner as the diagnosis and treatment are usually difficult, and the prognosis may be poor in some patients. Sometimes also referred to as "functional," "conversion," or "psychogenic," these disorders must be differentiated from "organic" disorders.
